Homíly Notes

The relatives and friends of Jesus acknowledged and even reclaimed his renowned wisdom and miracles. But when Jesus

claimed to speak to them in God's name, when he called on them to change their ways, even they became angry and wanted to throw him out of the village.

Now, we claim to know this same Jesus. It is the Holy Spirit who inspires our faith, who encourages us to pray, to read the Scripture, to engage in activities that help others and bring relief to others when they are in need. This engagement in faith in turn increases our hope in a better world as promised by Jesus when he proclaimed his Kingdom.

And yet, despite this faith which we proclaim every time we meet here on Saturday evening and Sunday morning, we still hesitate. We still look over our shoulder when someone asks us if we are Catholic. We still think twice before we talk to another about Jesus. We still say we don't have time when appeals are made for volunteers to serve in the community, to clean the church, or serve at Mass, or We still say we cannot speak when asked to be a Eucharistic minister or Reader or help prepare people for the sacraments.

Talking of his weakness and his temptations to abandon his faith, St Paul wrote, "I shall be very happy to make my weaknesses my special boast so that the power of Christ may stay over me, and that is why I am quite content with my weaknesses, and with insults, hardships, persecutions, and the agonies I go through for Christ's sake. For it is when I am weak that I am strong."

When we put all our hope in the Risen Jesus, we are strong and inspired and full of Gospel Joy. Nothing can defeat us. *Terry*

Sunday Thoughts

On Wednesday 3rd July, Fr. Moses, Moira Potier, Terry Philips and Sr Eleanor from St Anne's parish and I, joined 70 or more people from all over the archdiocese and beyond, at the

Second Catholic Social Action Network gathering. We have not yet received the promised report and copies of the talks given by the "experts". However, I would like to share from memory some impressions of the experience, so important in the life of the Church in Liverpool.

"Networking" is probably the main aim of the day. We met at St Margaret Clitheroe Centre, but many of the participants had no adherence to the church, even if we all work together. The conference brought together a large number of charities and organisations interested in the areas of the Crisis in Housing, Human Trafficking, Care for Creation, and the Welcome of Asylum Seekers and Refugees. Opportunities were plentiful to meet others involved in the same area of interests, whether it be at the tables in the conference room, in the 4 workshops or at lunch.

The morning began with 3 well-presented interventions, from people with experience and expertise. We learnt of the terrible crime of trafficking and slavery which continues to this day, where people are abused, exploited, enslaved, and even die in captivity. How can we forget the 23 Chinese Cockle Pickers, forced to pick cockles at night, who lost their lives in the rapid tide surge of Morecambe Bay, 20 years ago? It is only 4 years ago that 39 Vietnamese children and adults suffocated in the back of a lorry on their way to a life of slavery somewhere in this country.

We were challenged, as a Church Community, to take stock of and to open the doors of locked up churches, presbyteries, school buildings and other places which could be converted into less-expensive housing for refugees and other homeless people. The conversion done in St Bernard's church was held up as an example of good practice.

These are my outstanding memories of an excellent day, where our faith was again challenged by those victims of modern society whose sufferings pour shame on us who live in the 6^{th} richest country of the world.
