Homily Notes

The stories of the cedar and the mustard tree being places for the birds of the air to rest and inhabit, have a purpose for both the prophet Ezekiel and Jesus. It's not so much the tree that is important, rather, it is the birds. Jesus says the birds of the air shall find their rest in their branches... All birds of the air are welcome. Ezekiel, imagines the restored Kingdom of Israel as the promised land with the people living in peace and equal justice but we, enlightened by the Easter events, see in it the herald of the True Kingdom of God initiated by Jesus. He says: "Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind." Every kind of bird is welcome in God's Kingdom.

We are the birds.

Everyone is welcome in the Kingdom of God. We sometimes think of the Kingdom and mistake it for Heaven. Sometimes too we mistake it for the church. The Kingdom is wherever people are doing their best to live in peace and harmony, to love one another and to love God's creation of which we are part. It is where people appreciate each other and respect each other, whether or not we are of the same religion, the same social background, the same society, the same sexual orientation, or the same race. Everyone has a place in the Kingdom. What makes it the Kingdom of God is love, for God is love and the source of all love in creation.

Sunday Thoughts

To mark Refugee Week, that runs from 17 to 23 June, Bishop Paul McAleenan, Lead bishop for Migrants and Refugees for the Bishops' Conference, offers a reflection on three themes - his recent visit to the Bibby Stockholm barge, the impact of the Rwanda Bill, and societal attitudes towards refugees and migrants.

In late April, Bishop McAleenan visited the Bibby Stockholm, a large floating barge moored off Portland Harbour that accommodates asylum seekers - many who have fled torture and persecution.

The visit offered a chance to meet with residents, reflect on their plight and consider the pastoral care we could offer. At the time of the visit, the barge housed over 300 asylum seekers, but numbers do fluctuate.

"The most memorable part of the visit was undoubtedly meeting the residents and hearing their stories," said Bishop McAleenan. "I was deeply moved by their resilience, the commonality of their aspirations and their willingness to share their experiences, which are, sadly, often traumatic. Despite the hardships they had endured, their desire to find a home here and belong to a society to which they can contribute to, is a testament to our shared humanity."

"Indeed, I heard many positive stories from the local community - many going out of their way to provide support and a welcome for the residents. It was edifying to see Staff on the vessel genuinely engaging with residents, providing advice and helpful information to assist them to integrate more effectively."

Bishop McAleenan also reflected: "In the last few years, we have witnessed the wonderful work of Catholic communities across England and Wales, who have welcomed migrants from Ukraine, Hong Kong and elsewhere with acts of solidarity and practical help."

Bishop McAleenan's visit coincided with the recent passing of the Rwanda Bill. He remarked on the distressing impact the legislation was having on Bibby Stockholm residents:

"The result of the passing of the bill was certainly felt onboard. A number of residents had received letters from the Home Office mentioning the possibility of deportation to Rwanda. It is an unjustifiable policy and has created an unnecessary sense of fear and anxiety."

"The UK Government has a responsibility to ensure that we have an immigration system that upholds the dignity of human life. The Rwanda scheme does not do that."

Bishop McAleenan concluded his reflection: "During Refugee Week, I invite everyone to join in prayer and reflect on our understanding and belief that every person is made in the image and likeness of God. Let us remember that we all seek the same fundamental needs - safety, acceptance, and a place to call home."
